

or the last two articles we have been talking about how to prepare your Home for sale.

In my quest to clean out my closets and my kitchen, I have unfortunately discovered the dreaded TERMITE. YIKES

Termites are awful pests. Though they're small, homeowners still need to take measures to protect their property from termite Infestations.

My house was tented only four years ago!!! Because of the very warm weather, the ter-



mite population decided to swarm later this year, thereby leading me to believe that I had escaped a huge fear that lurks in the mind of the average homeowner, which is that I have termites In my house.

Now, let's be real, technically you can professionally tent your house and if your neighbors have termites, you can almost guarantee that they will migrate back to your home sooner than later. If the af-

fected property is all the way down at the other end of the neighborhood, you might not be too concerned. But, if the affected house is next door or just down the street, have your house checked by an expert ASAP.

Research tells us that the closer the termite problem is to your home, the greater the risk. All termite colonies have winged termite pals called swarmer's, which go around finding new places to start new termite colonies. A swarm that is nearby won't have to travel far to find your house. In fact, they may start eating the wood on your property immediately. Termites will not hesitate to wreak havoc.

There are two different treatments of termites. If they are not too **bad**, the exterminator could do what is called, spot treatments. However, usually they will recommend tenting the house instead.

When selling your home, 99% of the time, the buyer will require a roof and termite Inspection. I have never seen them so bad in all the years that I have been selling real estate.

If you are thinking of selling, take a **good** look around beforehand so that you are not surprised when the house Is Inspected. The wings can often be found in window sills, bathrooms, lamps and of course baseboards and wooden doors.



We celebrate American Independence Day on the Fourth of July every year. We think of July 4, 1776, as a day that represents the Declaration of Independence and the birth of the United States of America as an independent nation.

But July 4, 1776 wasn't the day that the Continental Congress decided to declare independence (they did that on July 2, 1776).

It wasn't the day we started the American Revolution either (that had happened back in April 1775). And it wasn't the day Thomas Jefferson wrote the first draft of the Declaration of Independence (that was in June 1776). Or the date on which the Declaration was delivered to Great Britain (that didn't happen until November 1776). Or the date it was signed (that was August 2, 1776).



So, what did happen on July 4, 1776?

The Continental Congress approved the final wording of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. They'd been working on it for a couple of days after the draft was submitted on July 2nd and finally agreed on all of the edits and changes.

July 4, 1776, became the date that was included on the Declaration of Independence, and the fancy handwritten copy that was signed in August (the copy now displayed at the National Ar-



chives in Washington, D.C.) It's also the date that was printed on the Dunlap Broadsides, the original printed copies of the Declaration that were circulated throughout the new nation. So when people thought of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776 was the date they remembered.

In contrast, we celebrate Constitution Day on September 17th of each year, the anniversary of the date the Constitution

was signed, not the anniversary of the date it was approved. If we'd followed this same approach for the Declaration of Independence we'd being celebrating Independence Day on August 2nd of each year, the day the Declaration of Independence was signed!

How did the Fourth of July become a national holiday?

For the first 15 or 20 years after the Declaration was written, people didn't celebrate it much on any date. It was too new and too much else was happening in the young nation. By the 1790s, a time of bitter partisan conflicts, the Declaration had become controversial. One party, the Democratic-Republicans, admired Jefferson and the Declaration. But the other party, the Federalists, thought the Declaration was too French and too anti-British, which went against their current policies.

By 1817, John Adams complained in a letter that America seemed uninterested in its past. But that would soon change.

After the War of 1812, the Federalist party began to come apart and the new parties of the 1820s and 1830s all considered themselves inheritors of Jefferson and the Democratic-Republicans. Printed copies of the Declaration began to circulate again, all with the date July 4, 1776, listed at the top. The deaths of Thomas Jefferson and John Adams on July 4, 1826, may even have helped to promote the idea of July 4 as an important date to be celebrated.

Celebrations of the Fourth of July became more common as the years went on and in 1870, almost a hundred years after the Declaration was written, Congress first declared July 4 to be a national holiday as part of a bill to officially recognize several holidays, including Christmas. Further legislation about national holidays, including July 4, was passed in 1939 and 1941.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 17.5-ounce package refrigerated sugar cookie dough
- 1 8-ounce package cream cheese, room temperature
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Strawberries, blueberries and chipped topping for decorating

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- 2. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. On the parchment, press or roll the cookie dough into a large rectangle. You may need to use flour to keep hands or rolling pin from sticking.
- 3. Bake the cookie for 15 to 20 minutes or until the edges are golden brown and the middle is cooked. Remove from oven and allow to cool completely before decorating.
- 4. In a medium bowl, beat together the cream cheese, powdered sugar, and vanilla. Mix until smooth.
- 5. Wash and dry the fruit. Slice the strawberries.
- Spread cream cheese mixture evenly over the surface of the cookie. Decorate flag as shown with fruit.
- 7. Place whipped topping in a piping bag fitted with an open star tip. Crete white strips with whipped topping.
- 8. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Best if served immediately.

A BROKEN-WINGED EAGLE PART 2 OF 6

In a personal time of severe grief, I felt God draw particularly close to me. I alternated between feeling strong and feeling helpless. One moment I had absolute faith that God was in control, and the next moment I lamented about what the future held. To be sure, I was an emotional mess. One morning, quite unexpectedly, the Lord spoke these comforting words into my heart, "I see your faith. I see your strength. You are an eagle."

I sure didn't feel like an eagle!

He continued, "But for a time, you are a broken-winged eagle."

Gulp. There's nothing like God setting His stethoscope upon your spiritual heart to get an accurate reading. His assessment brought me comfort. My mourning was not a lack of faith – not at all. Instead, because my heart was so broken, I had neither the strength nor the ability to *mount up and fly*. The Great Physician had deftly and tenderly confronted the lie that I'd been believing. I'd been feeling guilty for not being *strong*. I'd wrongly confused brokenness for a lack of faith.

With those words, God made it possible for me to grab hold of the truth that – while we may be as strong as an eagle in our faith – there will be times when we become like a *broken-winged eagle*.

Shortly after this experience, I wrote a letter to a raptor center, a place that specializes in birds. Clearly this was before the days of easy internet access, and the question I asked them had to be asked because it was haunting me. I asked them this question: When a bird, in particular an eagle, is in the wild and develops a broken wing, what happens to it? I held my breath in response! Does it starve to death? Does it get attacked and killed by another predator? A short time later, I received a response to my question. The answer was short and sweet – "In answer to your question, it doesn't fly."

I couldn't help but laugh with relief.

Humor aside, I found that simple reply to my question quite profound. A broken-winged eagle is still an eagle...but for a time it's a grounded eagle. The eagle who was fashioned to glide effortlessly would now find himself at best hobbling. The capacity to fly – lost. And soaring? Forget it. In a time of brokenness, ascending would become but a distant memory. Limping along would now be more like it. The same is true for grieving people. In grief there are times when one is simply unable to do more than sit and wait on the Lord for healing.


